JOINT LECTURES

Our January Lecture Series, jointly presented by the Men's Club and the Jefferson County Historical Society, was tremendously popular with all who came out that evening. The speaker was Keith Alexander, who spoke on the 18th Century waterfront commerce near Shepherdstown. We provided drinks and light refreshments before the talk, which was attended by at least 120 people. Historic Shepherdstown loaned us chairs and there were still people standing.

The second of our Lecture Series for the new year was rescheduled for February 22 and was also a great success, especially considering the continuing bad weather, with approximately 65 attendees. The evening started off with drinks and light refreshments. Mr. Jim Taylor, President of the Jefferson County Black History Preservation Society, presented the second showing of "Road Trip to History - African Americans of Jefferson County, West Virginia." This was a recently released 27 minute video that was several years in the making. It included the oral history of many of our local folks and kept the audience spellbound. It has been said that Jefferson County has more African-American history than any other county. Members of the BHPS took many questions from the audience and also told us that they had recently returned from Charleston, where they were presented with certificates and a resolution signed by many Senators for their work.

The next lecture will be held on March 8, with Walter Washington and Betsy Wells presenting "The Washington Family in Jefferson County" which promises to be equally fascinating. We hope to see you there and hope Spring will be in the air and the snow will be gone!

Whew, this has been quite a winter! Please watch your step out there, especially coming and going around town. And while you're safely at home recuperating from the latest bout of shoveling, if you haven't already done so, please renew your Club membership for 2010.

Under the leadership of Mike Austin and the new Board of Directors, the Club has returned to fundamentals. We continue our traditional role as a casual social club and meeting place. And, as you're all aware, SMC owns and maintains two vital facilities for the use and enjoyment of the entire Shepherdstown-area community: the War Memorial Building and Morgan's Grove Park.

The grand old building, at the heart of Shepherdstown hosts some of the signature events in the area's cultural calendar, including the Goose Route Dance Festival, American Conservation Film Festival, Friday Painters, seasonal market places, Back Alley Tour and Tea, annual Book Sale, the haunted house for Halloween and a busy slate of other special events, meetings, concerts and shows that contribute to the lively and dynamic atmosphere of Shepherdstown. Many of these events are free and open to the public. Some generate revenue that helps us maintain this lovely old building, but we've got expensive repairs facing us if we're to keep this facility open for community use. Tom Keyrouze, one of our newest board members, has fearlessly jumped in as our building chairman and is developing a list of projects, large and small, and in search of willing volunteers.

The Park, located just a mile south of town, is one of the only public parks in the northern part of Jefferson County. Thousands of children use the Park year-round, exploring the wooded areas, playing soccer and volleyball, getting kites stuck in the trees, whooping it up in the playground, and doing what kids need to do to grow up healthy and strong. Folks come from all over the region to walk and run on the well-maintained fitness path.

Church groups, neighbors, wedding parties,

nonprofits, and other organizations regularly use the kitchen and dining pavilion. Everyone benefits from the preservation of this significant historic site and natural area – birthplace of the US Army, and headwaters of Town Run.
